Literacy is a vital component of instruction at Pathways to Success. Students in Ms. De la Pena's ESOL class and Ms. Barrett's Pre-GED class are enhancing their literacy by participating in an informative and entertaining joint activity: The Pathways to Success Book Club.

Students meet twice a week, after class, to discuss a book they have been assigned to read. For their first book, the classes read "Sadakko and the Thousand Paper Cranes," by Eleanor Coerr, which deals with the after-effects of the atom bomb on a young Japanese girl. As such, students researched topics like President Truman,

Word War II and post-war Japan. Participating in Book Club helps students to further develop reading, writing and comprehension skills. Literacy is complemented by various hands-on activities and project-based learning.

The first session of Book Club concluded on Monday, November 7, with a group discussion and pizza party in the cafeteria. Currently the classes are reading "Hatchet" by Gary Paulsen, the story of a young boy stranded in the Canadian wilderness following a plane crash.

Vocational Programs Target In-Demand Industries

As a school-to-work program, Pathways to Success places a strong emphasis on Career and Technical Education (CTE). We recognize the important role CTE plays in preparing our students for successful employment. Therefore, we develop our vocational programs (Retail, Computers, Culinary, Barbering, Home Health Aide, Carpentry) based on the current trends and employment needs of the local job market.
