An introduction to the legal system and the basic legal concepts pertinent to the structure, management and operation of businesses. This course will also examine current trends and issues relevant to the legal and ethical responsibilities of business. 3 credits

The learning objectives for the Business Law I course include a substantial range of legal and ethical topics within the business environment. Students will improve basic deductive reasoning skills and will acquire knowledge of both basic and advanced topics within the subject matter presented. Students will be engaged in learning activities that will enhance their competency skills in writing, critical thinking, oral communication, and information literacy. Specifically, they will be able to:

- 1. Discuss and apply the principles regarding the legal environment of business and business ethics and corporate social responsibility.
- 2. Apply the laws of corporate governance to management decision making.
- 3. Identify and discuss the legal relevance of different corporate structures.
- 4. Identify, discuss and/or describe various laws and legal concepts related to business law and its application to business entities.
- 5. Develop skills to identify and critically analyze legal and ethical issues in business situations and fact patterns and apply relevant legal concepts to address those issues.

Learning Goals

Develop a working knowledge of the American legal system. Gain a practical understanding of the basic tort and contract law concepts.

Learning Objectives

Identify and discuss the history of the American law and the sources of law in the United States. Explain the relevance of tort law, negligence and contract law in the business environment.
