Introduction

Student participation in class discussions about current political events will help broaden the understanding of how their participation in government is vital to American democracy.

<u>Political Science/American National Government</u> – College Link (SUNY Farmingdale) Requirements for Successful Course Completion

- 1. Your attendance in class is expected every day. Remember the school rule of 24 absences. Lateness is frowned behind. Three late arrival will result in one grade point being subtracted from your quarter average.
- 2. There will be several full period tests to given in the term. A passing final grade would require that you have a passing average on your tests. Tests and Quizzes will be announced in advance.
- 3. Each student will be required to submit a Viewpoint Essay on a current issue in American Democracy. A passing grade will require that you have a passing average on these essays. All essays must be submitted on their due date. An essay that is submitted late will lose 10 points for each date is that it is late. All essays will be discussed in class and due dates will be announced 5 days in advance. **Rubric to follow.**
- 4. Current Events on international and national news will be assigned on a weekly basis. All current event items must be submitted on their due date. A current event submitted late will lose 20 points. **Rubric and template to follow.**
- 5. Capstone Project a New York Sate Department of Education requirement for graduation will be developed and presented in class. Project topics are your or your groups choice but must focus on a public policy issue.
- 6. Class Participation is mandatory. Preparedness and involvement in class activities will be a deciding factor, up or down, of a student's grade.
- 7. Any difficulties that you may have in the course or problems that arise should be discussed with the teacher. Alternate arrangements can be made to meet unusual situations.
- 8. Assignments such as homework and projects are not limited to those activities submitted above. All homework assignments are due the next day, unless specifically given more time. Assignments submitted late will lose points.
