- [7] Perhaps we are fastened to our planet, even if we never set foot upon it.

Perhaps the gravity that keeps us down (most of the time) also ties our Selves to this place, the third rock from Sol, no matter where we are.

[8] But maybe not.

Maybe there's a way to feel at home someplace else, even in a void.

When the real spacewalkers, the brave souls who leave their ships and Venture into the big black Nothing, hanging on to everything they know by a single Thread of metal, when they look around them, do they feel at home?

Are they filled for those minutes with a sense that they really are a part of

All?

A Dangerous Walk

[1] Know the name Alexey Leonov? He was the first person to "walk" in space. This was back in 1965, when space flight

was still brand new. Leonov was on a Soviet space mission called Voskhod 2 with one other cosmonaut. Both men were lucky to survive.

- [2] The actual spacewalk took only ten minutes. Leonov was attached to the spaceship by a cord that extended 50 feet. Things did not quite go as planned. For one thing, Leonov's space suit ballooned, and he had trouble bending at his joints. He couldn't take any photographs because he was unable to reach his thigh to operate the camera. His body temperature shot up, and his suit soon filled up to his knees with sweat. Trying to return to the ship, Leonov got stuck in the outer hatch. In order to move more easily to free himself, Leonov lowered the pressure in his suit, a dangerous move which could have given him what deep sea divers call the "bends," a painful condition that can be fatal.
- [3] Leonov did get back inside safely, but he and his fellow crewmember's problems were not over. First, they had problems sealing the hatch through which Leonov had just gone. This caused the system to automatically flood the cabin with oxygen, creating a serious fire hazard. Then on the return to Earth, the automatic landing system didn't work, and the two men had to land the spacecraft manually. The ejection seats that are usually found in spacecraft had been taken out to make more room for the crew, so they had no way of escaping if they couldn't land properly.
- [4] The spacecraft spun crazily, but the men managed to land safely. However, their problems were not over. No one knew where they were. They had been forced to land in a heavily-wooded part of the Ural Mountains, and the two men spent the night there in the snow surrounded by wolves. Finally, search helicopters found them and the men were rescued.
- [5] All these close calls did not seem to decrease Leonov's enthusiasm for his job. He was the commander of the Soviet side of the first joint space mission between the Soviet Union and the United States. This was an important mission with symbolic significance. At the time of his spacewalk, the US and the Soviet Union were involved in a tense and dangerous "cold war," and were competing against each other in a "space race." The joint space mission represented a reduction in tensions between the two powerful nations. Leonov and American astronaut David Scott later wrote a two-person biography and history called *Two Sides of the Moon: Our Story of the Cold War Space Race*.
- [6] Leonov is also a talented artist. And while there may be more gifted artists, how many have been able to sketch pictures of humanity's home the Earth while looking down upon it in space?

[35] "Whip" is the sound, I'm sure you're aware of a

Whip as it speeds on its way through the air.

While "crack" is the noise that makes horses run

(Here's a few more; we're almost done.)

A train through a tunnel it really does "rumble"

[40] And the wheels on the track – they make a "click-clack."

If you don't speak clearly, you're told "Please don't mumble."
