
The US History regents exam is right around the corner.

Sections of the Exam

Part I



Multiple-Choice Questions

28 Questions.

Each question is worth 1 point, for a total of 28 points.

Questions are generally in chronological order.

Part II



Short Essay Tasks

2 Short Essay Questions.


Each essay is scored out of 5 points.

Both short essays you identify the **historical context** of the docs.

The first short essay, analyze the **relationship between** the two documents.

The second short essay, analyze the **audience, purpose, bias, or point of view** of the second document to assess reliability.

Part III A



Civic Literacy Essay Document Based Questions

This section has 6 documents related to a **constitutional or civic issue**.

Each document has at least **one analysis question**, worth 1 point each.

Part III B



Civic Literacy Essay Document Based Essay

This section asks you to **use the documents in Part IIIA to write an essay** scored out of 5 points.

The essay asks you to: Analyze the **historical context** for the **civic or constitutional issue**.

Analyze **efforts to address the issue** by individuals, groups or governments.

Analyze **either the impact of the issue on American society or the extent to which the efforts were successful**.



