### SUPPORT SERVICES AND RESOURCES

### **Counseling Services**

The Guidance Department at Roosevelt High School - Early College Studies has a complete staff of certified guidance counselors who stand ready to assist students in a wide range of issues. Our counselors provide academic skills support, organizational, study, and test taking skills, post-secondary planning, as well as career planning. On a personal note, they are willing to educate students in understanding themselves and others, provide coping strategies, discuss both peer relationships and effective social skill strategies, and provide students with effective tools for better communication, problem-solving, decision-making, conflict resolution, and study skills. The Guidance Department has brought in outside agencies to discuss topics related to career awareness and the world of work, substance abuse education, as well as multicultural/diversity awareness. They collaborate daily with parents, students, teachers, administrators, and the surrounding community.

### **Academic Services**

A variety of tutoring programs are available to support students in content specific areas. Many qualified peers, college students, and faculty members are on staff to help students succeed. Group, supplemental instruction and individual tutoring are available.

### Yonkers Partners in Education (YPIE)

Yonkers Partners in Education (YPIE) is a non-profit organization that works in partnership with Yonkers Public Schools middle and high school students to ensure they have the support needed to complete a post-secondary education. In addition to one-on-one counseling, YPIE offers a variety of programs to students and their families to assist in every step of the college planning process. From seventh through ninth grade, students register for Naviance, a college and career readiness computer program that they will use throughout high school. YPIE also provides college essay writing workshops, career exploration programs, financial aid and scholarship assistance, college tours, alumni interview day, and the new program called YPIE Scholars that matches a volunteer graduation coach with a student to guide them through all four years of high school.



### SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS FOR ECHS STUDENTS

The college application process for Smart Scholars ECHS students presents unique considerations compared to this process for traditional high school students. Special concerns for ECHS students applying for college admission are associated with credit transfer, advanced standing, and eligibility for opportunity programs.

Students must be aware that all of their college credits may not transfer. In general, the more competitive the institution, the more restrictive the policy on acceptance of transfer credits. In addition, some colleges may set a limit on the number of credits that can transfer, and/or the types of courses that can transfer. General education courses have a greater likelihood of being accepted for transfer credit. It is the student's responsibility to request the partner Institution of Higher Education (IHE) to send their official college transcript to the college at which they matriculate. A reference sheet listing links to college/university partners' websites for transcript requests is included in Appendix A.

The readings are also designed to enhance the use of critical thinking skills by engaging students in activities in involving analysis, synthesis and evaluation of a variety of literary and cultural topics within the scope of this course. This course grants three college credits.

**Prerequisites:** Three years of high school Spanish (up to Spanish CpB2) or


