On Tuesday, January 16th, Community School 13 was graced by Yonkers Board of Education and Yonkers City Council, which included special guests such as Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Edwin M. Quezada and even Yonkers own City Mayor, Mike Spano! It was a memorable moment for the entire school community to be recognized as December's "School of the Month. Visitors were introduced to many of the school's new programs and achievements. Such highlights included our active participation in the newly formed YASA program – Yonkers After School Academy, which allows its students to excel in an after-school curriculum that specializes in entrepreneurship. Among other initiatives, the school was commended on its STEAM magnet program (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts & Math) which not only engages students, but also encourages them to explore trial and error exploration through creative stimulation methods. Superintendent of Schools Dr. Edwin M. Quezada stated, "Community School 13's Principal Isabel Hernandez, along with her teachers and staff have revamped their curriculum and technology practices to provide a cohesive academic program. As a freshman in Electrical Engineering, Kimberly Bryant felt culturally isolated. She started Black Girls Code after noticing there's still a 'dearth of African-American women in science, technology. engineering and professions.' She says the lack of access and exposure to STEM topics are the likely reasons. Black Girls Code aims to teach young girls in-demand skills in technology and computer programming. In 2013, the White House named Bryant one of 11 Champions of Change for Tech Inclusion. She's also been named one of Business Insider's 25 Most Influential African-Americans in Technology. As of 2016, more than 5,000 girls had participated in the program since it began in 2011. We STEAM, we CODE! Today we honor you!


Celebrating the First 100 Days!
