Attended by more than 350 students and members of the community, this event was the eleventh job fair which has been held here at the Vive School. In attendance were some of the area's largest employers. Students had the opportunity to interview with these employers, and also to apply for positions online in our Computer Lab.

Health Care Careers Flourish at Vive School

At Pathways to Success we are continually seeking to enhance our vocational program offerings. Within the Hudson Valley, the career outlook indicates a continued need for health care related personnel. The New York State Department of Labor projects that occupations within this field will grow by 25 percent through 2022.

In order to address this demand, and to create career opportunities for our students, Pathways to Success has entered into a collaborative arrangement with training provider Westchester Medical Coder, Inc. (WMC). Through this collaboration, students will be able to pursue one of two pathways: Medical Administrative Assistant or Medical Billing and Coding Specialist. Successful completion of either pathway results in certification from the National Healthcare Association.

Another healthcare program, already offered at Vive is Home Health Aide (HHA), conducted by the Family Service Society of Yonkers. For the first time ever, students in the HHA Program received their Bloodborne Pathogens/ Infection Control Certificates here at the Vive School. Training was conducted by our partner Empress Ambulance, and each student received a certificate from the American Safety and Health Institute.

"Resilience" Screening Held at Vive School

Toxic stress is a syndrome caused by abuse and neglect incurred during childhood. Last month, all Pathways to Success teachers, counselors, administrators and Family Welcome Center liaisons had the opportunity to attend a screening of a new film which explores this important topic.





"Resilience" details the incidence of toxic stress, and chronicles a recent movement, led by pediatricians, educators, social welfare professionals and others, to fight back against toxic stress, using cutting-edge science and field-tested therapies.

The screening was followed by a group discussion/Q&A session with Dr. Andrew Bell, Mental Health Program Director of Westchester County. Attendees also feasted on delicious baked goods prepared by ESOL and Baking Teacher Rosemary Roche and her students.

Anti-Bullying and Breast Cancer Awareness Activities

In recognition of October being both Bullying Prevention and Breast Cancer Awareness Month, the teachers and counselors at Pathways to Success utilized a wide range of creative strategies to educate students on these important topics. A few examples:

- Ms. Haynes-Martin created antibullying lesson plans, including classroom activities, topics for discussion, terminology, examples and resources to assist students.
- ESOL students in Ms. Roche's class created a "STOP THE BULLYING" bulletin board, with each student contributing their ideas on how to solve the problem.
- Ms. Tamis' entire Pre-TASC class participated in a "Restorative Circle," a safe space in which each student had the opportunity to discuss their experiences with bullying.
- Students in Dr. Lara's ESOL class conducted online research into such topics as nutrition, healthy lifestyles and even family medical history, to promote breast cancer awareness. They also created bulletin boards,

- pens, pencils, cups and other items to promote awareness to others.
- Family Welcome Center Case Manager Linda Bohan visited each classroom to discuss breast cancer awareness and provide resources for teachers, who further explored the topic with their students.
- As a result of these efforts, 11 women over the age of 40, who had no insurance and had never received a mammogram, were scheduled to receive a FREE mammogram from our partner Hudson River Healthcare.
