More Joy From Saunders

Different Cultures Celebrate Christmas

In many cultures, they all have their festive ways to celebrate Christmas. Some cultures possibly have treats or desserts that appear on the dinner table once a year. They also may have special ways to give gifts, hold parades, or decorate in a certain tradition or culture. In my house, we celebrate Christmas on Christmas Eve, we have a big feast and have fun opening gifts that we've given one another. The day after especially, we open more gifts and go to my aunt's house to eat the same food we had the day before.

Christmas is widely celebrated worldwide, including in non-Christian countries. Every family may also have treasured traditions and ways to celebrate Christmas – like watching holiday movies, sipping eggnog, or teaming up to cook an elaborate feast. Christmas traditions around the world are unique as they come and hold special relevance to elevate the occasion. Some traditions are as old as time, and some are a combination of different cultures coming together. So, how do people celebrate Christmas? Let's take a short tour around the world to learn more:

First and foremost, in Japan, Christmas is a relatively new holiday, having gained widespread recognition only in the past few decades. Rather than a religious celebration, it is viewed as a joyful, romantic time for couples or an occasion for ordering KFC or dining out instead of cooking a large meal at home. December 25th is recognized more as a couple's day than a day for family. Couples can be seen out and about on romantic dates or strolling around enjoying all the winter illuminations.

In Poland and Polish communities worldwide, Christmas Eve dinner, or Wigilia, begins with the sharing of Oplatek, a paper-thin, square wafer made of flour and water that features an image of the Nativity. At the start of the meal, each person at the table breaks off a piece of the wafer and exchanges holiday greetings before passing it along to the next person. Occasionally, even pets join in on this festive tradition.

In Mexico and many other Latin American countries, families celebrate Nochebuena on Christmas Eve with a huge feast, singing, dancing, and often a piñata for children. While some attend midnight Mass for religious observance, the evening remains focused on bringing family together.


In Sweden, Finland, and Norway, St. Lucia's Day is an important part of the Christmas season celebrating St. Lucia, said to be one of the first Christian martyrs. On this day, candlelit processions are held with the eldest girl in each family dressed as St. Lucia in a white gown and candle wreath. The girls also serve S-shaped Lucia buns and coffee or mulled wine to their families.

Lastly, Iceland celebrates Christmas in a unique way, with festivities beginning 13 days early. Children receive gifts from 13 Santa Claus-like figures called Yule Lads, each with distinct personalities, though some can be mischievous. Well-behaved children who place their shoes on the windowsill are rewarded with small gifts from the Yule Lads. However, children who misbehave may find rotten potatoes in their shoes instead.

However you celebrate your holidays, remember to take a moment to appreciate other holidays that are celebrated by students here at Saunders and around the world.
