On Thursday night October 8th, Lincoln High School hosted the second annual City of Yonkers District-wide College Fair. Approximately sixty colleges and universities were represented and their representatives had set up booths in the gymnasium. Thousands of students, parents, siblings, teachers, and administrators attended. The large size of the Lincoln High School campus was more than able to accommodate the large number of attendees. Dr. Michael Yazurlo, then Superintendent of Schools, welcomed the information seekers. Mrs. Laurie Austin, Director of Admissions and Recruitment of Lehman College (C.U.N.Y.) also addressed the audience.

Principal Ian Sherman prepared several classrooms for people to obtain specific information related to the college search. In one room, Yonkers Partners in Education arranged an Admissions Panel in English, and a second room was prepared for Spanish speakers. Another topic and classroom featured, 'My Child is Going to College.' Again, one classroom featured English speakers while a second featured Spanish speakers. Still, a fifth classroom was utilized for the topic, 'How am I going to Pay for College?'

Horticulture Program

Our Lincoln High School Horticulture class has been a work in progress at both an academic level and an engineering level regarding the production of three pro-type units. The first is a soil-based growing station that allows for hands-on of growing a variety of flowering plants and vegetables indoors. The soil used was manufactured in the Lincoln Eco Park compost area. Our students were eager to start experimenting with pole beans, radish and romaine lettuce seed, all of which have just starting growing (See Photos 1 and 2). Two new hydroponic test units were designed and built by our students with the aid and supervision of Mr. Hatem and Mr. McManus. Hydroponics is a water-based system for quick growing of plants and vegetables. It consists of an aeration (oxygenated water) unit which contains added nutrients. The nutrients that we have added are a suitable liquid used in dosed quantities. These are circulated by a water pump through the system. To build our hydroponic units, we used PVC pipe and gutters, with a 3.5 gallon plastic storage container used as a holding tank. The growing station and two hydroponic test units are up and running.

We are also experimenting with a variety of floating mediums for seed bedding, so that, seed-to-plant can be achieved in our water based system (See photos 3 and 4). Our students are presently working on the construction of two 'Live' Bio Sphere Eco Systems. We hope to complete these by the Spring of 2016.

A new addition to our program was called Plants-to-Medicine. Our students really enjoyed a brief history of how plants are related to and are still in high demand for research in medicine.

Our centerpiece (See Photo 5) was constructed out of discarded material, an old Con Edison wooden wire spool, scrap wood and a disposed light. This reflects our 'first class's' motto, 'Reuse, Restore, Recycle!' Well done! Go Green!

From what grade level representatives have been told so far, the student body has many different requests for the Student Government. Freshmen have asked for updated technology, better sanitation, more sports equipment, and a study hall period. Sophomores want less restrictions on dress code, more sanitation, and slight changes in the cafeteria menu. Juniors have asked for more African-American historical curriculum, additional clubs, school held activities to reduce stress, science credit for Science Research class, senior trips, school dances, and availability of the courtyard during lunch. Seniors have requested that bathrooms remain open and stocked with soap and paper towels, class trips be made, snack machines offer more food, natural juices be served, allowance of food to be ordered from places other than the school cafeteria, and much more. There are many ideas that could change the school, and the only way they could ever possibly be brought to light is if they are brought up to the Student Government.

The first Parent Teacher Student Association (PTSA) meeting of the 2015-2016 school year occurred on September 30th at 6:30-8:30 p.m. in the Lincoln High School library. Students in attendance included Marisa Valencia, Estelenny Gomez and Amera Hernandez. Parents in attendance included Leidy Mota who is the President and Lorraine Valencia who is the Treasurer. Teachers in attendance include Ms. Carmalita Cacace who is the Corresponding Secretary, Ms. Linda Vitulli, and Mr. William Sweeney. Administrators in attendance include Principal Ian Sherman, Mr. Jonathan Cartica, AP, Ms. Sandy Hattar who is the Recording Secretary, AP, Ms. Swanson, AP and Dr. Angela Arias. Ms. Mota made cup cakes for the meeting. Coffee, pecan pie, cookies and water were also available.

The first action was voting for the Vice President and Secretary. Five positions were available.

Sofia Woo, treasurer of the Yonkers City PTA reviewed the legality of the voting. She explained several requirements including that students can run for vice president only if the student is 18 or older, unless an adult supervises her. She called for nominations for president. Leidy Mota was nominated, voted in, and approved. Then, the by-laws were approved.

Principal Sherman spoke to the gathering, "Bring a friend to the next meeting. Also, teachers at Lincoln High School are using a free app that allows for students to get messages from teachers for homework. Ms. Hattar sent or will send messages to notify parents to keep phone numbers updated.

Ms. Sandy Hattar, AP stated that this week (in late September) was our first full week of school. The Yonkers District-wide College Fair will held at Lincoln be on October 8th, and that a majority of students attending last year at Saunders were Lincoln High School students. Ms. Hattar said, "It takes a lot of strength to come out and talk in public about your experiences with bullying. We are having a conversation because it is current. October is Anti-Bullying Month."

Principal Sherman said that most bullying is on-line. *Cat fishing* is used and it takes the identify of someone else. Cat fishing is so common that MTV made a show on this. Today, we don't see most bullying because it's on social media. If your child uses social media, parents have to police it. The bullying in high schools in the old days like taking lunch money doesn't exist now. Now, it never stops. It continues twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week on social media. We will have a workshop on bullying. We are learning the vocabulary. Another new bullying technique most people don't know about is 'receipt' which is taking pictures of conversations and storing it, then showing when they are going. Kids are talking their own lingo. If you hear something you don't know, question it.


Anti-Bullying Speech

After finding out I was cat fished, I thought the horror was over. Sadly, I was mistaken and from January until the end of the school year was the worst. I know you often hear people say that they hated school. I was one of them. My mother would force me to go to school. She told me if I stayed home I would be showing them fear. Most of the time I would cry on my way to school. I had despised going to school. Every day I would see my bullies. I had class with them, and had lunch with them. I saw them all the time in the hallways. I always heard them call me names. I always felt their stares, even when I looked to see who was staring. They would not look away. They would bump into me sometimes. I remember not eating lunch because I was too afraid to get up and go get food. I did not eat dinner sometimes. I would fall asleep having not eaten. I would have nightmares and waking up in the middle of the night.

The best part of it all, no one in the school actually helped me. My old principal and assistant principal never actually helped me. They thought they were helping me. In reality, they were taking the bullies side and defended them. Every day, my mom arrived at school in her Timberlands and with her hair always slicked back just in case I would get jumped. Thankfully, that did not happen. My worst fear was the chance of getting beat up in the bathroom. I would not have anyone to help me, or even know that it would be happening. Thankfully, it never happened.

From my lack of eating, I lost a total of an unhealthy thirty pounds. I have regained some of the weight. I transferred to a new school and have

met some amazing people at Lincoln High School. Did I get justice from everything I went through? No, I did not. No one was suspended. No one was ever written up. Nothing happened. All I was left was pain and stress-related eczema. I was using tons of different medicines because it was affecting so many areas of my body. Thankfully, I also regained my health.

I cannot tell you enough about how serious bullying is. Please, if you or someone you know is being bullied, please speak up and do something about it. This one experience changed who I am. If you need to talk to anyone about it, you can talk to anyone you feel comfortable with. Even me. I will try to help you in the best way I can.


















Boys Soccer Team




